Couple leaves entire estate to lymphoma program

Ann Maurer Birdseye and **William Birdseye** are a married couple in their mid-60s who enjoy a comfortable lifestyle and spend a great deal of time on their 35-foot yacht sailing the Great Lakes. Knowing they won't be around forever, they recently got their estate in order. With no children, grandchildren or siblings, the Birdseyes still wanted to know they made a difference in this world and thought it made good sense to bequeath their entire estate to benefit St. John Hospital and Medical (SJH&MC) after they are both gone.

Selecting a specific area for their bequest was

easy. Because Ann was diagnosed with non-Hodgkin's lymphoma in 2001 and has been under the treatment of Ayad Al-Katib, MD, Medical Director of Oncology and Section Chief of Hematology, the Birdseyes wanted the lymphoma program to benefit from their gift.

"I just love Dr. Al-Katib—he has done wonders for me," Ann said. "We are so impressed with him and the Lymphoma Clinic of Michigan, and we want to do something significant to benefit the lymphoma program and the work he does."

Named as one of the area's top oncologists for

the past few years, Dr. Al-Katib is known nationally and internationally as an expert in lymphoma and related diseases. Also a professor at Wayne State University, he established SJH&MC's lymphoma clinic—the only one of its kind in metro Detroit. Dr. Al-Katib wants to expand the lymphoma program to enable SJH&MC physicians to participate in advanced investigative research protocols that offer promising new treatments in the comfort and convenience of a community-based hospital. The Birdseyes' estate gift will help enable the continued progress of the lymphoma program.

"Dr. Al-Katib is a kind, intelligent man with so much to offer patients and so much more he wants to do. We're happy that the funds from our estate will help fund this important

endeavor for patients," Ann said. "I'm so glad that Dr. Al-Katib and the Van Elslander Cancer Center are right here in our area," Ann said.

The Birdseyes lived in Grosse Pointe Farms for years. But when Ann was diagnosed with lymphoma and started treatments, they wanted a one-story house so she could get around easier. They ended up buying two lots on the river in Harrison Township and building a house.

Before retirement, Ann who has a legal background, worked as a forensic economist during the day for years and as a professor who taught labor economics at Wayne State University in the evenings for 25 years. Bill, who was a Detroit police officer for 15 years, now works as Treasurer/Business Manager for the Police Officers Association of Michigan, a full-service labor organization which provides labor-related services to more than 10,000 police officers.

Right now, Ann considers herself fully healthy, and

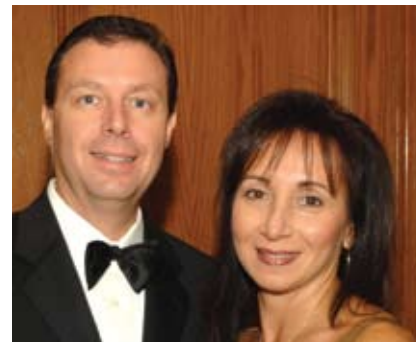

she's enjoying her free time as a retiree. "I'm very active maintaining our property and waterfront," she said. Ann has also spent time making cancer notebooks for other cancer patients. "A cancer diagnosis is overwhelming," she said. "Having a notebook for all the information such as records, lab results, appointments, doctors' business cards, a calendar, etc., helps you feel somewhat in control. I made and gave out about 250 notebooks to patients until St. John started distributing their own patient notebooks."

The Birdseyes currently make a monthly donation to the lymphoma program since their estate gift won't benefit the hospital until the future. "We started giving to SJH&MC in smaller ways, like buying Fontbonne White Christmas Ball tickets, but we wanted to do something specifically for the lymphoma program," Ann said.

Grateful family gives back

Over a period of four years, **Jim and Donna Zyrowski** and their children Jimmy, Christina, Melissa, Nicholas, Michael, Bryan, Jessica and Maria spent a great deal of time in the Pediatric Intensive Care Unit (PICU) at St. John Hospital and Medical Center (SJH&MC) with **Benjamin**, the youngest member of the family.

Benjamin was born prematurely in July 2004 with major complications including hydrocephalus, microcephaly and cerebral palsy. He frequently had trouble swallowing, which caused aspirations that often turned into pneumonia, leading to hospitalization in the PICU many times.

With Benjamin's numerous inpatient stays, the family became very close with the physicians, nurses and other staff of the PICU, Occupational Therapy and Physical Therapy, and the staff noticed how the whole family was extremely loving and attentive. Yet there is no love like a mother's. During her young son's hospital stays, Donna selflessly devoted herself to Benjamin, only leaving his bedside when she went to the restroom or for a quick errand.

Sadly, Benjamin's short life came to an end at the age of 4 in September 2008. Amidst their grieving, the Zyrowskis were still thinking of others and wanted to do something to show their appreciation for the compassionate care Benjamin received—they wanted to give back so that other families with sick children could benefit.

Even though the entire family pitched in to help throughout Benjamin's life, Donna remembers how difficult it was to take time to relax and keep up with daily family responsibilities while spending countless hours at Benjamin's bedside. This is what inspired the family to use the gifts made in memory of Benjamin to purchase a new 26-inch flat screen television and desktop computer for the PICU family waiting lounge. Now families like the Zyrowski's have a place to relax as well as access the internet

to manage daily responsibilities like paying bills or sending updates to family and friends via email.



Benjamin's family has since made an additional donation of their own. Donna hopes that this gift, along with the remaining funds from memorial gifts, can be used for further enhancements to the PICU family lounge to help make families more comfortable during a stressful time. Breast cancer walks benefit SJHS

The St. John Health System (SJHS) Breast Care program is the recipient of a \$100,000 Komen Detroit Race for the Cure 2009

grant. Funds will be used for the "Because We Care" program, which will provide breast screening opportunities in Macomb,

Wayne, and Oakland Counties to approximately 500 women under age 40 who have been identified by their physicians as being at high risk for developing breast cancer, and who are uninsured or underinsured. A group of 30 to 40 SJHS physicians will participate in the program by identifying qualifying participants and providing referrals to one of SJHS's seven digital mammography centers in the tri-county area.

Breast cancer patients at the Van Elslander Cancer Center at St. John Hospital and Medical Center will also benefit from the proceeds from the 1st Annual *Pink and Blue United for a Cure Walk*, which took place June 13 at Stony Creek Metropolitan Park. The walk was hosted by the Team Angels Breast Cancer Foundation, a group of volunteers committed to making a difference in our community by raising funds in support of breast cancer and increasing awareness that this disease affects not only women but men as well. Proceeds of \$10,000 from more than 225 walkers will help purchase medications, medical equipment and other items that will improve the daily lives of breast cancer patients with limited resources.

To assist in the care of the community, St. Joan of Arc Catholic Church in St. Clair Shores is sponsoring two comfort carts for St. John Hospital and Medical Center (SJH&MC)—one in the Spiritual Care department and the other in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit.

The purpose of the carts is to provide a way of bringing comfort and consolation to patients and their loved ones by creating a space that is soothing and promotes peace and reflection. The carts are brought into a patient's room by a chaplain or associate for patients who are very sick and/or nearing the end of their life.

The comfort carts are stocked with beautiful quilts, a CD player with a selection of soothing music, soft tissues, calming lotion for massaging a patient's hands or feet, toiletry items for family members, snacks, spiritual materials, journals, teddy bears and books for children, and other items which patients and family members can select to help them through a difficult time.

Church members held fundraisers such as candy and specialty bread sales to help finance the project.
